

DENBIGH ROAF CHURCH STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

Entering the Church porch on the south (left) side is a window depicting the Burning Bush - symbol of the Presbyterian Church. This was given by Miss Grace & Miss Marion Shedden in memory of their parents, David & Annie Shedden, to commemorate the Church's 75th Anniversary 15.3.70. All the Shedden family were great workers in the Church - choir, Sunday School, PWMU.

Straight ahead are the main doors in to Church surmounted by a window depicting Christ washing the disciples' feet. The doors & window are a fitting memorial to Dr. Murray Tallent, our "beloved physician who served for many years as elder, church secretary & S.S. treasurer, & was always at the door before & after services to speak to people - especially visitors.

On the north side, the first window was given by the Congregation to commemorate the memory of members of the parish who fell on active service during World War II. The window depicts the Good Samaritan aiding the injured stranger.

"The Risen Christ" commemorates the life & work of Noel Challen, who attended our Church all his life. He was an Elder for many years and Session Clerk for some 10 years prior to his death.

David with his harp is a fitting scene to remind us of Andrew Jack, for he

served the Lord with gladness as an Elder & choir master.

Robert Cornwell, a quiet man, whose rather dour look hid a keen sense of humour and understanding. He served as treasurer for many years.

The Steel family have been associated with the Church since early this century. David Steel was Session Clerk for many years & was a trustee of the property - a position of trust his son accepted after his death.

The window showing the Apostle Andrew with the boy who shared his fishes reminds us of Miss Amy Best who gave so much of her love & time to the children in the Sunday School.

Mrs. R. McClelland joined the Armadale congregation in 1906 & was a faithful worker in the Church for 32 years.

Mrs. Sarah Gough, her daughter & grandchildren all worshipped here. Mrs. Gough's special interest was the P.W.M.U., so Dorcas & her acts of charity is a fitting memorial.

The Good Shepherd window in memory of John Cramond was given by the Tallent family as a tribute to the sterling years of service he gave as Elder & Session Clerk.

The window showing Jesus with Martha & Mary recognises the work women have done in serving their church - in this case Mrs. Agnes Thom, a friend & co-worker with Mrs. Gough in leading the P.M.MU. Mrs. Thom was a daughter of the Rev. Thomson, minister at Melvern.
